



October 14, 2025, APAC Meeting Minutes

3. APAC Report – APAC Chair Amy Robbins

- *APAC has a business meeting scheduled for October 27th at 10 a.m., focused on council-specific business items, voting, and committee updates.*
- *APAC will be completing its first Board of Regents report, and members will be kept informed.*
- *Members are encouraged to attend learning and listening forums across the state to share their voices, both as APAC representatives and WSU employees. **Listening sessions have been postponed until 2026***

Listening sessions will focus on five questions:

1. *With an eye towards the needs of our future students, what is WSU's greatest opportunity to provide better education?*
2. *Recognizing the rapid pace of societal change and the delivery of education today, what are the greatest risks that you worry will put the university off course?*
3. *What do you think the President needs to know about the Cougar community? Who are we and what do we represent?*
4. *What are the most pressing research challenges that you think we should be known for over the next decade?*
5. *What is the one thing that you think should define your campus or the WSU System for the next decade?*

Call to Action: *Members are asked to reflect on these questions and integrate them into their thought processes and contributions.*



4. Committee Updates

5. Speaker presentation (9:45 am) – Keela Ruppenthall, IT Security Consultant

Michael Walters, Vice President, Information Security: Cybersecurity and AI at WSU

Washington State University's Information Security team is proactively addressing the rapidly evolving landscape of cyber threats. Key initiatives include:

- Continuous Threat Monitoring: The team actively tracks emerging cyber threats to detect, respond to, and prevent attacks.
- Accelerated Threat Emergence: The time between threat discovery and its appearance in WSU's systems has decreased from months to days, necessitating faster response strategies.
- Cybercrime Marketplaces: Malicious tools are now widely available online, increasing the speed and scale of cyberattacks.
- Human Vigilance: Individual awareness and reporting are crucial. Notably, a breach method used against a major Salesforce subsidiary was identified at WSU before public disclosure, thanks to a staff report.
- Reporting Culture: The "see something, say something" approach is emphasized to enhance early detection.
- Security Leadership: The Governance, Risk, and Compliance group, led by Keela Ruppenthall, is committed to staying ahead of threats.

Keela Ruppenthall, Information Security Consultant: AI Use and Cybersecurity Awareness at WSU

AI Use at WSU

- WSU provides access to Microsoft Copilot, with both free and paid versions.
- Paid version (\$30/month) offers deeper integration with OneDrive, email, and other files.
- Enterprise Protected Space ensures data security when logged in with WSU credentials.
- Copilot can summarize emails, documents, and suggest actions based on user activity.

Security and Privacy Concerns

- AI tools can access and infer sensitive data if not used properly.
- FERPA data and identifiable human subject data are acceptable in some WSU tools.
- HIPAA data and other regulated information must not be shared with AI tools.
- AI-generated transcripts (e.g., Zoom) are subject to Washington State data retention laws.

Best Practices for Using AI

- Use internal, vetted tools like Copilot for sensitive tasks.
- Avoid uploading full datasets with identifiable information to public AI tools.
- Prefer aggregated and anonymized data when using AI for analysis.
- Always validate AI output manually to ensure accuracy and compliance.
- Use human-in-the-loop decision-making to maintain accountability.

Interactive Scenarios

- Email Drafting: Use AI to improve grammar/tone without including student data.
- Meeting Minutes: Use Zoom transcription + Copilot summary, review for accuracy.
- Data Analysis: Upload only aggregate data, remove identifiers, verify results.
- Coding Assistance: Ask AI about logic/errors without sharing API keys or passwords.

Risks of AI Use

- Over-reliance: Users may trust AI too much without critical thinking.
- Excessive agency: AI agents may act beyond intended scope.
- Hallucinations: AI may generate inaccurate or misleading information.
- Policy violations: Using unapproved tools like ChatGPT can breach WSU guidelines.

Positive Use Cases

- Grammar improvement, brainstorming, research, translation, and troubleshooting.
- AI can enhance productivity and accessibility when used responsibly.
